Making local public policies through the concept of Commons? An action-research at the crossroads of public administrations and citizen stakeholders in the Clunisois, Region of France.

The project is based on 3 years of participatory action-research in a very small town of the rural area of Burgundy. The action-research took place between actors of civil society, activists and associations on one side, and the local public administrations on the other side. The presentation focuses on two case studies of *commons*: a forest and a beautiful abandoned sanatorium.

***The (over)touristification of European historic cities:
a relation between urban heritage and short-term rental market demand***

Most of the latest research on the tourism phenomenon is based on a single-case study methodology – deeply rooted in a descriptive way, limited to a "snapshot" assessment. Therefore, my research aims to propose a complementary method that would allow for the presentation of a comparative assessment of trends related to a given phenomenon (its quarterly change over the years), covering a large range of case studies.

The *peer-to-peer seminar series* is an informal and horizontal venue for PhD candidates, faculties, affiliates and visiting scholars to present and discuss their current research, foster mutual exchanges and critical feedback, and promote future cooperation in line with the collaborative approach that animates our daily work. It is part of the *Economic Geography Seminars* organized by the *PhD curriculum in Economic Geography and Territorial Statistics*.
